### HOW TO VOTE THIS ELECTION

The Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights and its All Voting is Local campaign launched *And Still I Vot*e, a call to action to empower our communities to fight for a democracy that works for all of us. We promote solutions that remove barriers to voting, share testimony from those fighting for a full, inclusive democracy, and mobilize people to take action. Our campaign is for people who believe everyone's voice should be heard and are willing to fight for fair, safe, and accessible elections.

This fall, make your voice HEARD. Below is what you need to know to get registered, vote, and ensure your ballot counts:

Election Day is TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 3.

Note that some changes may occur as a result of litigation or executive orders, so please check for the latest information on the State Board of Elections' website <a href="here">here</a>.

If you have completed your sentence (including probation and/or parole) for a nonviolent offense, you may register and vote. See <a href="here">here</a> to find out if you qualify.

## Make sure you are registered to vote:

- Register to vote online <a href="here">here</a>
  (deadline for online registration is 4 pm on October 5), OR
- Print and complete an

  application, and then mail
  to your county clerk's office
  (application must be

  postmarked by October 5)
- You can also register in person at your county clerk's <u>office</u> or request that an application be mailed to you (deadline for in-person registration is 4 pm on October 5)

Consider voting **early in person**. Anyone in Kentucky can vote early for this election.

Beginning October 13, every workday (Monday through Friday) up until Election Day (November 3), and every Saturday for at least four hours, every county clerk will provide a location for safe in-person voting. Contact your county clerk's office for details.

If you can't vote early in person, please consider **voting by mail**. Due to <u>COVID-19</u>, anyone in Kentucky may vote absentee. Please request your ballot as soon as possible – two to three weeks in advance of the election – and return your completed ballot one to two weeks before Election Day on November 3.

- Apply online <a href="here">here</a>.
- Applications made online must be **received by** October 9 at 11:59 pm. (Other means to apply may become available after this date. If you can do it online, do it before October 9.)
- Completed ballots must be **postmarked** by November 3 (Election Day) and received by November 6. You can also return your ballot to a deposit box (contact your county office for details).

If you wait to **vote on Election Day**, please get there early! Polls open at 6 am and close at 6 pm (if you are in line by 6 pm, you may vote regardless of how long it takes). You can find your polling location <u>here</u>.

**REMEMBER:** Bring your ID (see permitted types <u>here</u>) with you; if you can't get an ID before Election Day, you may sign a "reasonable impediment" declaration and then vote.
