


## LOUISIANANS: **HOW TO VOTE THIS ELECTION**



The Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights and its All Voting is Local campaign launched And Still *I Vote*, a call to action to empower our communities to fight for a democracy that works for all of us. We promote solutions that remove barriers to voting, share testimony from those fighting for a full, inclusive democracy, and mobilize people to take action. Our campaign is for people who believe everyone's voice should be heard and are willing to fight for fair, safe, and accessible elections.

This fall, make your voice HEARD. Below is what you need to know to get registered, vote, and ensure your ballot counts:

Election Day is **TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 3**.

Note that some changes may occur as a result of litigation or executive orders, so please check for the latest information on the secretary of state's website <u>here</u>.

## Make sure you are registered to vote:

- $\mathbf{M}$  Register to vote online <u>here</u> (deadline for online registration is October 13).
- $\mathbf{M}$  Print and complete an application, and then mail to your registrar's <u>office</u> (must be postmarked by October 4).
- $\mathbf{M}$  You can also visit the registrar's office in <u>person</u> to register (deadline is October 4).

Consider voting **early in person**. Anyone in Louisiana can vote early.

- Early voting is October 16-27 (excluding Sunday, October 18 and Sunday, October 25) from 8:30 am to 6 pm.
- $\checkmark$  You can find your early voting location <u>here</u>.
- REMEMBER: If you registered to vote by mail, bring a piece of identification with you; if you don't have photo ID, you can bring a copy of a utility bill, bank statement, or other government piece of mail.

If voting in person isn't an option for you, consider **voting by mail**.

**IMPORTANT:** In Louisiana, you must have a specified excuse in order to vote by mail. See whether you qualify <u>here</u>. If you do qualify, please request your ballot as soon as possible – two to three weeks in advance of the election – and return your completed ballot one to two weeks before Election Day on November 3.









- $\mathbf{M}$  You can request an absentee ballot <u>online</u>.
- $\mathbf{M}$  You can also <u>request</u> one by mail, fax, or in person.
- Applications must be received by the parish registrar <u>office</u> by 4:30 pm on October 30.
- Completed ballots must be received by the parish registrar <u>office</u> by 4:30 pm on November 2 (the day before the election); you can return your ballot by mail, in person, or (upon request) by fax.

If you wait to vote on Election Day, please get there early! <u>Polls</u> open at 6 am and close at 8 pm. You can find your voting precinct <u>here</u>.

**REMEMBER:** If you registered to vote by mail, bring a piece of identification with you; if you don't have photo ID (with signature), you can bring a copy of a utility bill, bank statement, or other government piece of mail. If you don't have an ID, you may swear to your identity by affidavit and then vote a ballot.
